Visitors to our headquarters may have noticed a very special piece of art in our entrance area. Maritime context is harmonized with environmental protection and the special aesthetics of nature. For those wondering what it stands for: here's a little insight into the background.

Margaret and Christine Wertheim became known for their international collaborative art project, The Hyperbolic Crochet Coral Reef. Coral reefs, with their vibrant colors, intertwining and intricate shapes, and curling and rippling surfaces, are the central theme of Australian sisters Margaret and Christine Wertheim. As natural scientists and artists, they analyze the aesthetics of mathematical theories and biological phenomena. For this purpose, they founded the "Institute For Figuring (IFF)" in Los Angeles in 2003. Its purpose is to promote public understanding of the poetic and aesthetic dimensions of science, mathematics and technology - and at the same time to draw attention to the concerns of nature and the environment. They also demonstrate the aesthetics of mathematical and scientific theories.

In the crocheted coral reef, the traditional handicraft technique is combined with the threatened beauty of marine ecosystems and complex mathematical structures to create a participatory work of art. All participants act as artists who help decide the shape of the coral reef.

The Wertheim sisters inspire their art practice with ideas from scientific fields such as physics, logic and computer science. Science writer Margaret and poet and former painter Christine are driven by the belief that concepts normally described by equations and algorithms can also be made accessible through playful physical activities. Hyperbolic geometry can be crocheted; fractals can be created from business cards; and the logic underlying computers can be represented in drawings. The sisters' goal is to make "abstract" concepts understandable and fun through "material play. "Who are Margaret and Christine Wertheim?

Margaret and Christine Wertheim (b. Aug. 20, 1958, Brisbane) are a pair of Australian sisters who combine science and aesthetics to raise awareness for the protection of large coral reefs (→ Contemporary Art). Their artwork, "The Hyperbolic Crochet Coral Reef," is a pointed ecological statement they have been working on since 2003. In addition, the crocheted coral reef is shaped by all participants together.

CADET PROGRAM

The Döhle Yachts' co-sponsored cadetship programme, supporting those enrolled at the prestigious Warsash Maritime Academy, is proud to have taken on its newest cadet, Jack Watson.

Alongside our co-sponsor, Trinity House, we are delighted to have now given an opportunity to five young people at the beginning of their maritime careers.

We caught up with Jack, as well as our advanced cadets, Joe Parrett and Will Mellor, to check in on their progress.

Jack: "I am the first cadet Döhle Yachts has sponsored who is focussing on engineering and, despite being only one month into the first phase, I am already enjoying it immensely. There was an immediate sense of family with the other cadets, which helped me settle into student living. This course isn't like normal university, in so far as my timetable is quite busy; usually, 9-5 every day. I have an engineering workshop on Monday and Tuesday, which is an enjoyable and practical way to start the week, and the rest of the week

sees lessons from some excellent and knowledgeable tutors."

Joe and Will began their cadetships during the height of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020.

Joe: "Because of the threat of another lockdown, it was decided that we would initially learn online and sit our exams in person. It was a difficult start to the cadetship as phase one is a steep learning curve, especially when not in a classroom environment. That said, the lecturers did well to adapt the course to this new learning style and we as a cohort were largely unaffected."

Will: "Following my exams in December 2021, I joined Marella Cruises' 'Marella Explorer 2' in Barcelona. At the time of joining, she was struggling with the rise in COVID-19 cases, so all crew had to adhere to very strict protocols, which meant a Christmas and New Year in isolation. In early 2022, we crossed the Atlantic to begin our winter Caribbean and Central America season and this was also affected by COVID-19, meaning we were designated as a 'COVID-19 hospital ship' in Barbados for two months."

Joe and Will are now approaching phase five and their final exams.

Joe: "Next June, I will be completing my final exams and I will look at all opportunities available to me, once qualified. I have a keen interest in sailing superyachts but, having now experienced cruise ships, I would like to gain further commercial experience as I work towards my Chief Mate's Certificate of Competency. The highlights of my time at sea include cruising the Norwegian Fjords, experiencing the Northern Lights, sailing the Pelican of London, and visiting the Azores. It has been a great experience and I have made many friends along the way."

Will: "My final placement as a cadet has been on board Trinity House's buoy tender 'THV Galatea'. I joined in early August 2022, when she was in dry-dock in Middlesbrough for her 5-yearly docking surveys. I have approximately a week left on board as a cadet, after accruing 12 months' sea time, 7 months' bridge watchkeeping, and a completed training record book. I am looking forward to being back in Southampton for phase five and my final academics of Advanced Stability and Maritime Law, a handful of short courses, and then my Officer of the Watch orals around May 2023."

Jack has been adapting to his new way of life: "I have had to make some adjustments on a personal level.

Moving away from home means that I have had to manage my own money but, thankfully, this has been achievable because of the generous monthly cadet bursary I receive. Whenever I tell someone that I am sponsored by Döhle Yachts, their reaction always shows me how lucky I am to have this coveted sponsorship. Since childhood, I have always wanted to become an engineer on superyachts, so being part of the cadetship has made it feel like my plans are coming together. I am at a defining point in my life and having Döhle Yachts right behind me, supporting me through this course, is a dream come true."

Richie Blake, MD of Döhle Yachts, noted: "Jack is our fifth cadet, and we wish him all the best in his studies and his career. Our cadetship programme involves placement on a range of vessel types, so this will give Jack a well-rounded experience of life at sea. Niklas Weidmann Co-Founder tilla

For more than a year we are closely cooperating with tilla, to approach the many challenges in crew change. Hence, we like to share an interview with the innovative co-founder Niklas Weidmann with you.

What is behind the start-up tilla?

Founded in April 2021, tilla is a Berlin-based early stage SaaS (Software-as-a-Service) start-up. I, along with Narayana Venkatesh, am the co-founder of tilla, which currently employs a team of eight.

Our vision is to utilize state-of-the-art, human-centric software to bring maritime workforce management into the 21st century. Our ambition is no less than setting the new standard in this segment and to build a product that is loved by seafarers and operators alike.

Our first product targets one of the industry's key pain points. Wildly inefficient and notoriously stressful, crew logistics is a complex mesh of repurposed tools. By leveraging a variety of data sources, tilla's platform eliminates many mundane and error prone processes, while reducing crew change costs and facilitating collaboration between all stakeholders. By doing so, tilla makes crew operations more humane and efficient.

Does the name tilla have any meaning?

To differentiate ourselves from existing maritime software products, we were looking for a catchy and easy to remember brand name. tilla is derived from the English word tiller (in German = Ruderpinne), which can be interpreted as a small thing that steers the larger whole.

How did you come up with this project?


In recent years, I have been genuinely interested in understanding how the nature of work is being reshaped by not just technology, but also other macro factors such as social trends and the COVID-19 pandemic. As I delved deeper into this topic, I got in touch with the founders of the maritime-focused company builder Flagship Founders who introduced me to the world of crew management and its challenges. Together with Flagship Founders, we identified crew changes as a worthwhile pain-point to

address, and chose it as our strategic entry point into the maritime workforce management industry more broadly.

How do you perceive the shipping industry?

Coming from the world of technology start-ups, I must say that the shipping industry is absolutely fascinating - not least because of its global relevance and the many interesting people I've met throughout the past year. I do enjoy meeting – or hearing about – the numerous resilient entrepreneurs who cut their teeth in and eventually shaped the industry.

Despite its reputation as a traditional and risk-averse industry, there is a palpable and increasing desire for technology-led change and innovation across the sector. Whether it be software to improve and optimize processes and outcomes, or hardware to reduce CO2 emissions.



It will be interesting to look back at this question in five years from now!

What are your tasks as Co-Founder?

While my individual tasks and responsibilities as a cofounder are very diverse, my broader responsibility is to ensure that we are on the right track to build a successful product and company. First and foremost this entails recruiting the right people and making sure that they have everything they need to excel and grow in their job. Equally important are my responsibilities to excite new clients and investors about tilla and its vision, making sure that the company is operationally and financially healthy, and of course overseeing a great product that puts our customers ahead of their competitors.

Through a lot of hard work, maintaining high standards and some luck, Narayana and I have not only been able to build a stellar team, but also found within one another great partners in crime who share a sense of responsibility and ambition for reshaping the industry.

Is there a target for what you want or need to achieve?

We're striving to make the biggest impact in the shortest time possible and thus have set ourselves ambitious sales and product targets. Our goals for the

next 12 months include significant progress on the product, which will naturally facilitate our business goal of pushing our customer count into the double-digits.

How and where do you find the right people for such a start-up?

Hiring the right people early on is critical for laying the foundations for a successful start-up. We use several channels for our talent acquisition, e.g. direct sourcing via our network, LinkedIn jobs and for certain positions - e.g. for software engineers - we use dedicated platforms. Since we're operating in a remote setup and our team is spread across several countries and continents, we have more flexibility with regards to sourcing our talent.

How can one imagine start-up financing?

An early stage financing round supplies start-ups with financial means to get going. In return, the investors become shareholders of the company. There are several parameters to keep in mind when pursuing a financing round, e.g. the cash need, the evaluation of the company at the time of investing and the type of investor (e.g. business angels, venture capital funds or strategic investors).

STEAMED BUCKWHEAT & GRILLED SALMON IN MANGO SALSA

Ingredients

Dish: Salmon Zuchini Slice

Beetroots Buchwheat

Mango

Bell Pepper (red & green)

Salt & Pepper Garlic

Olive Oil

Sauce: Egg Yolk Butter Lemon Salt & Pepper



Notes


Make sure that you only use medium heat or steam heating when preparing the sauce in order to avoid the egg to be over cooked. Do not over grill the salmon so that it will not become dry and maintain the juiciness and tenderness of the fresh salmon.

DIRECTIONS

Season the salmon with salt & pepper. Reheat the griller. Slice the zucchini, season with salt, pepper and olive oil and grill. Boil the beetroots and grate into thin slices. Add salt, pepper, olive oil, and fine chopped garlic. Boil the buckwheat and season with salt until cook. Cut the mango in thin slices together with red & green bell pepper in same size. Mix them together and season with salt & pepper. Assemble on a serving plate. Grill salmon in a preheated fryer.

Prepare the sauce in sauce pan. Melt the butter then add egg yolk and mix it well. Make sure that you only use medium heat then add lemon, salt, black pepper and small vinegar. When done place the sauce on a serving plate.
